

Post Serif is a slab serif typeface that is a tribute to post cards from the photocrom era, produced by predominantly Curt Teich & Company starting in 1939. Post Serif draws on the visual language of faces like Lubalin graph and other geometric slabs while staying more true to the monoline nature and lower x-height of the type found on the photocrom postcards— upgraded with special alternates that modernize the feel of the typeface overall.





This typeface is a work in progress.

Post Serif currently only contains one weight, but supports many different languages through combining marks. Purchasing a license for the typeface during this work in progress phase entitles you to a lower price (new releases will be more expensive). The Chrysler Building, an iconic Art Deco skyscraper in New York City, was designed by architect William Van Alen and completed in 1930. Standing at the intersection of 42nd Street and Lexington Avenue in Midtown Manhattan, it quickly became a symbol of the city's architectural ambition and the machine age of the 1920s. Originally commissioned by real estate developer William H. Reynolds, the project was later taken over by Walter P. Chrysler, who saw it as an opportunity to create a lasting monument to his automotive empire. Chrysler worked closely with Van Alen to redesign and expand the original plans, pushing for a taller and more ambitious structure. The building's distinctive Art Deco style is evident in its sleek, metallic ornaments and geometric patterns. At Chrysler's request, the facade incorporates automotiveinspired details, such as gargoyles and eagles resembling Plymouth hood ornaments, and corner ornamentations modeled after 1929 Chrysler radiator caps. One of the most striking features of the Chrysler Building is its iconic crown. Composed of seven radiating terraced arches clad in stainless steel, the crown creates a sunburst pattern that has become synonymous with the New York City skyline. The spire, which was secretly constructed inside the building and hoisted into place in just 90 minutes, allowed the Chrysler Building to briefly claim the title of world's tallest building at 1,046 feet (319 m). The Chrysler Building's construction was part of an intense competition in New York City to build the world's tallest skyscraper. This race reflected the economic boom and real estate speculation of the 1920s, as well as the architectural trends of the time. which favored simplified designs and Art Deco aesthetics as symbols of progress and modernity. Despite its completion coinciding with the onset of the Great Depression, the Chrysler Building has endured as a beloved architectural masterpiece. Its innovative design, luxurious interiors, and distinctive silhouette have earned it recognition as one of the finest buildings in New York City. In 2005, it was ranked as the favorite New York tower by a panel of architects, builders, critics, engineers, and historians, cementing its place in architectural history.
